Features

- At key stage 1 and 2, the key knowledge progression documents take full account of the National Curriculum's writing strand and the Progression Through Genres document
- The transcription strand (spelling and handwriting), the composition strand and the grammar and punctuation strand of the national curriculum are outlined discretely and not within each genre
- If a statement does not appear in every year group, this does not mean it is not relevant to the subsequent year groups. Teachers need to take note of earlier statements and ensure children are still given the opportunity to practice, embed and master the knowledge or skill.
